As minister of transportation, last year I had the pleasure to sign our new agreement on air services. We have established close cooperation with SBB and welcomed the new cars of the Haifa "Carmelit" that we bought from Switzerland in 2018.

Before concluding, I would like to wish the Jewish community of Switzerland continued prosperity.

The State of Israel will always stand with you in the fight against Anti-Semitism.

We will continue to work together to raise awareness about the Holocaust among the younger generations.

In this regard, I want to commend Switzerland for being a member of the "International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance" and for leading it in 2017.
